

The Story Animals

Fish

Skill level:
Beginner

Finished size:
approximately
20cm long



What you will need:

- Fabrics (see fabric note) – 1x Fat Quarter (50cm x 53cm). Available at major fabric retailers and enough to make three fish.
- Fish paper pattern piece (see page 6)
- Sewing and paper scissors
- Pins or quilter's clips and pin cushion
- Sewing machine or needle and thread. Doll needle or long needle.
- Heavy-duty or waxed thread (floss)
- Stuffing (polyester fiberfill or similar) You can use recycled material. Wash and dry old pillows on the gentle cycle in your washing machine. Leave to dry in the sun.
- Pen
- Unpicker
- Iron
- **Optional:** Buttons, embroidery thread or paint/brush for eyes and scales

Note: Buttons may not be suitable, depending on the age of the children you are making the toy for. Alternatives include painting, ironing on vinyl cut outs or hand embroidering eyes.

Seam allowance

1cm seam allowance is included on the pattern piece.

Fabric note: For all **Story Animal** projects, we prefer to upcycle, reuse and repurpose – please recycle all materials wherever possible. You could choose any cotton fabrics, ie. flannel sheet or fabric offcut. Using garments or repurposing fabrics you have at home often means the item has a textile story which adds a personal value of the finished item.

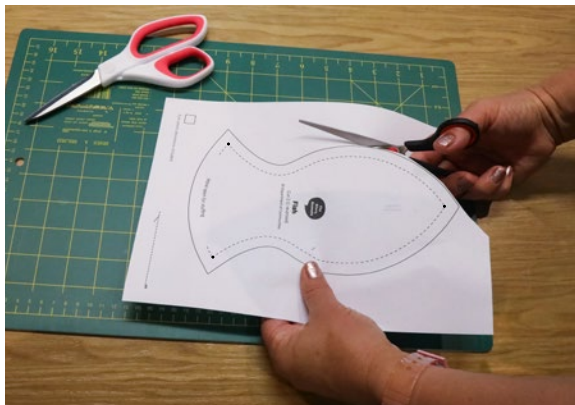
What you will need:



Making the fish

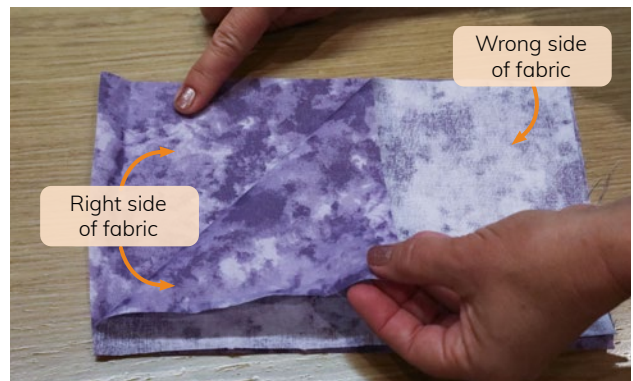
Instructions:

1. **Cut out the pattern piece using paper scissors.**



2. **Prepare your fabric;**

- Place two pieces of fabric with the right sides facing each other.



- Place the fish pattern piece on the fabric and pin securely.



On the fabric use a pen to mark dots and the tail opening

or use a pen to trace around the pattern piece.



3. Cut out the fabric

- Using sewing scissors, cut around the pattern piece along the lines, as the 1cm seam allowance is already included. You should have two identical pieces.



Tip:
keep scraps
for stuffing.



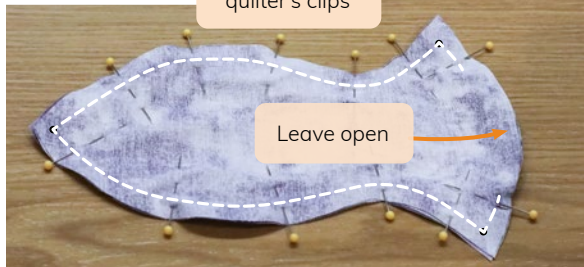
4. Prepare to sew

- Place the two fabric pieces right sides together.



- Pin them in place to prevent shifting while sewing.

Use pins or
quilter's clips



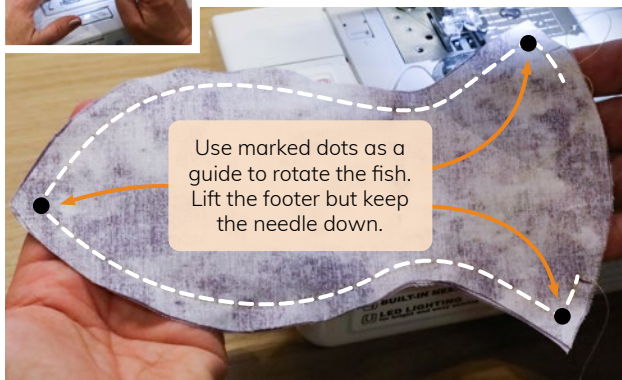
Leave open

5. Sew the fish

- Sew around the edges, following the 1cm seam allowance and leave the tail open for turning inside out and stuffing.



- Back-stitch at the beginning and end to secure the stitches.



Use marked dots as a
guide to rotate the fish.
Lift the footer but keep
the needle down.

6. Clip the curves:

- Carefully clip the curves and corners without cutting through the stitches. This helps the fabric lay flat when turned right side out.

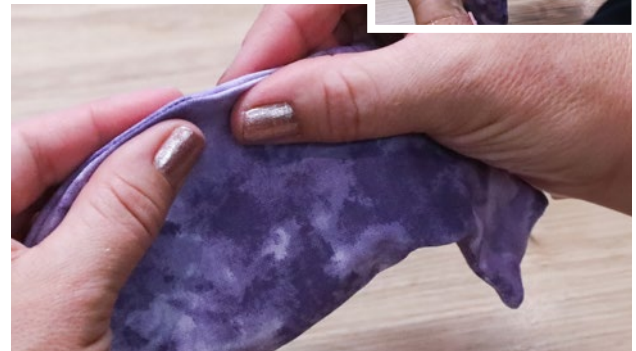


7. Turn the fish right side out:

- Turn the fabric fish right side out through the opening.



- Use a pencil or end of the scissors to gently push out the corners and roll the seams flat.



8. Iron the fish (optional):

- Use an iron to press the fish flat, ensuring the seams are crisp.



9. Stuff the fish:

- Stuff the fish with small pieces of polyester fiberfill or similar stuffing material, including fabric offcuts, until it reaches your desired level of firmness.

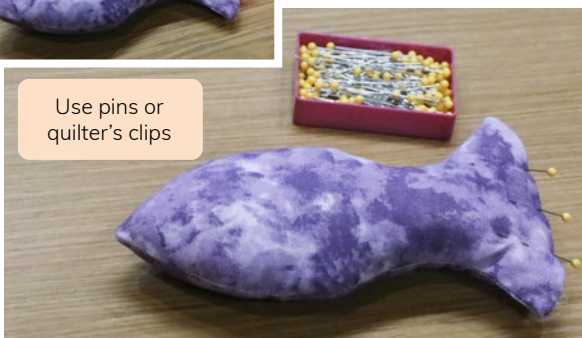


10. Close the tail:



- Fold the edges of the opening inward and pin or clip together.

Use pins or quilter's clips



- Sew shut.



- Optional: You could stitch a pattern across the tail.



11. Eye socket

- Using a needle and floss, stitch back and forth through to head a few times to make an indent or 'eye socket'.



12. Add buttons (optional):

- If desired, sew on buttons, embroider,



or paint eyes on both sides of the fish.



- You can also add any other decorative elements like scales or patterns using fabric paint or additional stitching.

You made it!



Note:

Indigenous print fabric is living art. Usually, the fabric will name the artist who designed the print, on the 'sedge' – the border of white running down one side of the material. Out of respect for the artist, the print process and the story of the pattern, keep all of your scraps wherever possible. You can use any smaller scraps as stuffing. Trim and keep larger offcuts for future projects.

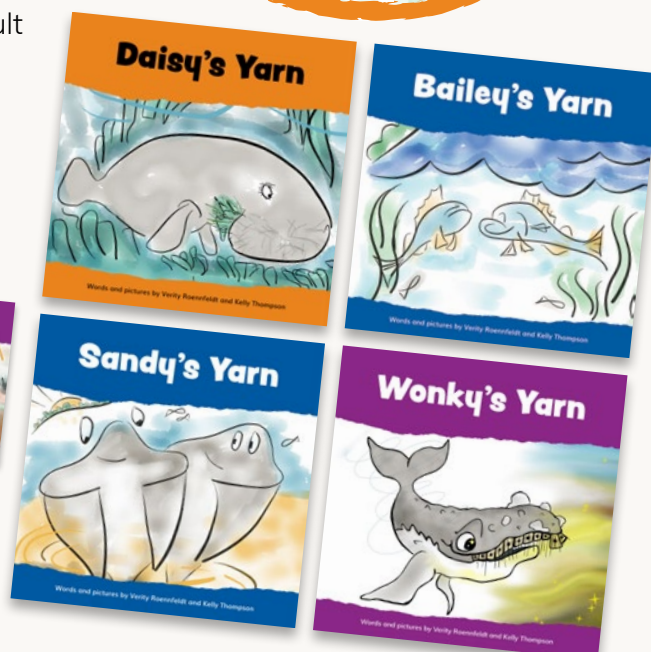
The Story Animals
