Changes to the NDIS law



Australian Government

Department of Health,
Disability and Ageing

The **Department of Health, Disability and Ageing** spoke to the Council.

We call it DHDA for short.



DHDA answered questions about the changes to NDIS law.

The questions were about



- Changes to NDIS plans



- Changes to NDIS prices



- What the changes mean for regional areas



- What 'supports' mean



- Keeping people with disability safe



The Council members also told DHDA what they thought about the changes to the NDIS.

They said



The Council is worried about children leaving the NDIS when they turn 7 and having no supports.



The Council wants to know how the new law will work when people need a change to their NDIS plan.



There are problems in regional and remote areas, like not enough workers to help people with disability.



It is important to speak with people with disability about any changes made to the NDIS law.



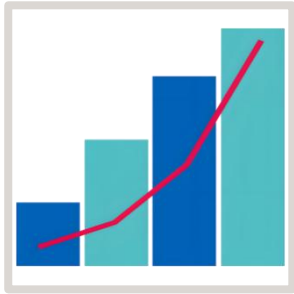
DHDA said many things are still not clear about the NDIS changes.



We will all know more after we see the **Senate** report on 14 August 2026.

The Senate is part of the government that helps make the rules for Australia.

2025–26 NDIS data



There were two talks on the NDIS **data** for January, February and March 2026.

Data is information and numbers that help us understand how something is going



The National Disability Insurance Agency spoke first. We call them the **NDIA** for short.

The NDIA spoke about



How many people are going into the NDIS.



How many people are leaving the NDIS.



How funding is being used by people on the NDIS.



How many service providers there are.



How many people are complaining to the **Administrative Review Tribunal**.

The Administrative Review Tribunal is a place you can go if you think a government decision is not fair.

They are called ART for short.

Quality and Safeguards Commission

The NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission spoke next. We call them **the Commission** for short.

The Commission spoke about

REGISTRATION



The new rules for **mandatory registration** for NDIS providers.

Mandatory registration means providers must sign up before they can help people in the NDIS.



Worries about regional areas where there are not many workers to help people with disability.

Next steps



After the meeting, the **Chairperson** will tell the **Minister** what Council talked about.

The Chairperson is Stuart. He runs the meetings.



The Minister is Hon Hannah Beazley.



The next meeting is on **16 September 2026** in Narrogin.
