13 MAY 19 OTHER ISSUES MANNING + PROTECTING · ACCESS TO IMPORTANT PLACES IS A CULTURAR RESPONSIBLITY - THE ACT + OTHER LEGISLATION NEED TO ENSURE PEOPLE WITH SUCH RESPONSIBILITY CAN ACCESS SUCH PLACES FOR THIS PURPOSE · INCLUDE PROVISIONS FOR REPATRIATION OF MNCESTRAL REMAINS · AHS SHOULDN'T HAVE TO CHOOSE SOMEONE FROM DIRECTORY OF HERITAGE PROFESSIONALS · STANDARDS OF H. PROFESSIONALS SHOULD INCLUDE · INFORMATION ON H.P.'S SHOULD BE PROVIDED TO DEVELOPERS TO ENCOURTGE THEMY TO USE BEST PRACTICE (NOT JUST 'CHEAPEST') - + REGION SPECIFIC EXPERTISE · SHOULD BE A MECHANISM FORSEEKING FURTHER DETAILS ON REMSONS FOR DECISION BY MINISTER



13 MM 19 BROOME REGISTER/INFORMATION · SITES IN 'O THER HORITME PLACES' NEED TO BE INCLUDED. · SOME PLACES NEED TO BE RESTRICTED + KEPT CONFIDENTIAL · LAHS NEEDS TO HAVE SAME LEVEL OF ACCESS TO INFORMATION AS THE STATE (FOR LAND THEY ARE MANAGING) · DEVELOPERS SHOULD ATPROACH LAHS OR STATE ON A NEEDS BYSIS - SHOWDN'T BE OPEN ACCESS TO QUERTHING ON REGISTER · TOURISTS SHLD MISO BE ENCOURAGED TO AVOID SITES (BY CONTACTING LAHS) · CLOSED INFORMATION TO BE MANAGED BY LAHS! STAVE · CLEAR CULTURAL REMSONS WHY THERE SHOULD NOT BE MANDATORY REPORTING OF ALL SITES - BUT COULD BE REGULARD TO REPORT FINDS TO THE LAHS (CYTOURISTS) · WITH HUMAN REMAINS, POLICE SHOULD BE ACCOMPINIED 134 PORSON WITH CUTURAL KNOWLEDGE

LAND USE PROPOSALS · PROCESSES NEED TO ENSURE DIFFERENT FROUTS ARE CONSULTED WHEN IMPAGE GO BEYOND IMMEDIATE DEVELOPMENT · NEFDS TO COVER LOCAL GOVT. PLANNING MOCESSES EG PLANNING SCHEMES - CONSULT WITH LAHS (AMONDMENT TO P. D.ACT ?) · AGREMENTS NEED TO ALLOW FOR PROPONENT LATER IDENTIFYING A SITE (AFTER INITIAL AGREEMENT / APPROVAL) (MANDATORY REPORTING) · LAMS SHOULD HAVE SOME INPUT ON WHAT IMPACTS ARE OR ARE NOT CONSIDERED ALLEPTISE + APPROPRIATE LEVEL OF IMPACTS · TOURISM IMPACTS NEED TO BE INCLUDED · LAYS SHOULD HAVE VETO RIGHTS IF HERITHE IS TOO IMPORTANT TO DESTROY. · STILL NEED TO BE ABLE TO HAVE OPEN + CLOSER REPORTS ON SURVEYS



13 MAY 19 ABURIGINAL HERITAGE COUNCIL · AT LEAST 50 % OF MEMBERS SHOULD BE ABORIGINAL (AS WELL AS CHAIR) · NEED MORE PEOPLE WITH CULTURAL KNOWLEGE · MAKE SURE NOMINATION PROCESS ENCOURAGES PEOPLE WITH CULTURAL KNOWLEDGE TO APPLY · COULD HAVE A GROVE OF CULTURAL BOSSES TO SUPPORT + ADVISE AHC · SHOULD HAVE A DISPUTE RESOLUTION FUNCTION (INCLUDING RE DISPUTES BETWEEN LAHS + DEVENDED) · SHOULD BE AN ABORIGINAL COMMITTEE WHO CAN CALL OF EXPENTS AS NEEDED, ET, WATER, MINING, ANTHROETE L) HERE BOARD SHOULD BE REPRESENTATIVE OF DIFFERENT REGIONS

BROOMF ENFORCEMENT A PROTEGED AREAS * REMOVING ANCESTRAL REMAINS SHOULD BE AN OFFENCE · STOP WORK URDERS - DEPT. NEEDS POWER IN EMERGENCY SITUATION (AS WELL AS MINISTER'S POWER) · Enforcement officers should have to do C.A.T · LAHS RANGERS COULD HAVE A COMPLIANCE ROLE -ES REPORTING POSSIBLE BREACHES TRAINING COSTS NEED TO BE PROVIDED · DEPT. NEEDS ADEQUATE RESOURCES · PROCESS FOR PROPOSING PROTEGED ARCTS NEEDS TO BE TRANSPARENT + HOCOUNTAINE - LANS TO BE INFORMED OF ALL SUBMISSIONS ETC
