

WA ACE Grant

Final Report – September 2021

In 2020 the Energy Transformation Association for the Kimberley (ETAK) was awarded a WA ACE Grant to achieve the following outcomes:

- Increased understanding of the energy needs of the Kimberley community
- Increased energy knowledge of ETAK members

The following report outlines the origins of ETAK, the situation in 2021 and the activities that ETAK delivered to achieve the project outcomes.

Energy Transformation Association for the Kimberley

A number of businesses, industries, energy suppliers, indigenous organisations and individuals have joined together to form ETAK with the aim of fostering sustainable and economically robust development of the Kimberley underpinned by affordable and reliable energy. The association was inspired to form following the "Energise the Kimberley" conference in Broome where Senator Dean Smith invited attendees to bring "a common voice" to the government. (ETAK purpose document 2020)

ETAK was initially formed to build a 'common voice' for the Kimberley in response to Senator Smith's invitation and also to:

- Actively promote the need for, and scope of, the energy transition
- Engage with local and State Government, incumbent energy suppliers, local communities and traditional owners to promote the aims of the Association
- Support and promote projects that can further the aims of the association

While these goals have remained consistent since ETAK's formation, when it came to delivering activities for the WA ACE grant several things had shifted which had ramifications for what we were seeking to achieve. These included:

- The onset of the COVID pandemic resulted in the founding management committee members having less time and energy to put to the organisation. Some of the founding members also changed roles or were unable to attend for various reasons. This resulted in the need to reinvigorate and grow the membership of the organisation while at the same time providing a level of leadership in starting a conversation towards providing a common voice and a level of leadership.
- An economic stimulus package saw Horizon Power committing to a number of upgrade projects in the Kimberley and the development of a Broome Customer Experience Centre.

Progressing the Conversation – a workshop on 3rd August 2021


The issues outlined above, particularly the first one, resulted in a lack of one clear concrete desired outcome for the planned 'co-design workshop'. Was this an event to get interest in ETAK and its purpose, to gain buy in to the concept of energy transformation, to start to

solve some of the problems that people identified or some combination of all of these?

To cut through this challenge we went back to the core codesign – Collaborative Governance and the first step of committing to collaboration – did people want to start the process of working together and the associated issues of building trust and capacity? And could we start to co-define the dilemma? The discussion would focus on Broome as a starting point in the process.

Professor Ray Wills from Future Smart Strategies started the conversation, talking about the future of energy in the Kimberley, before we moved onto the barriers, asking where are we at? What is working, what's not? While we weren't able to arrive at specific solutions to the numerous barriers of such a complex problem, the following table captures the key themes and what ETAK could do to address these barriers

During the workshop discussions there was an ongoing tension between those that wanted to focus on the opportunities that are provided by the energy transformation and driving towards that vs those that wanted to focus more on articulating the problems. This was a symptom of the broadness of the topic but while it was a challenge on the day the process clarified for ETAK that they wanted to primarily drive a narrative of opportunity – and finding ways of addressing constraints to that – rather than being predominantly an advocacy or problem solving organisation.

The discussion also helped define the focus of ETAK as being an organisation for the business community rather than the broader general community and, importantly, there was agreement amongst participants that they wanted to carry on the conversation. The 'commit to collaboration' part had been achieved, albeit with a lack of clarity on what that yet meant.


To drive this positive conversation within the business community It was decided to follow up with two subsequent processes to drive this positive conversation – one on one meetings with Ray Wills and business owners and aligning with a Broome Chamber of Commerce event to launch the new solar car park. We were able to achieve this within the initial budget of the project.


Aligning with Broome Chamber of Commerce "Canapes Under the Canopy" sundowner event on 17 September

The conversations held with the abovementioned organisations were highly positive, and the intention is to progress these conversations to becoming signed members of ETAK and ultimately, signed and paying members of ETAK.

The other avenue for self sustainability of the group which is currently under development is a potential collaboration with the Broome Chamber of Commerce and Industry.
