
Acknowledgment of Country

WA Buy Local Policy 2022 (WA BLP 2022) Update released in April 2022

- Ensures the approx. \$30 billion spent in State Government contracts creates more work for regional WA businesses.
- Regional Price Preferencing:
 - Regional business preference;
 - Regional content preference.
- 43 Agencies have now signed Implementation Agreements and are applying WA BLP 2022.
- Changes made in April 2022 to help local businesses employing people with a disability win work.

Local Capability Fund

Peel Regional Round 2022

- To enhance the capacity, capability and competitiveness of Peel businesses to supply Government or the private sector.
- \$100,000 total fund 75% of eligible costs up to \$20,000 per business.
- To be eligible, applicants must;
 - Hold an ABN, be GST registered, and be for profit;
 - Be principally based in the Peel region;
 - O Have been in businesses for at least 12 months; and
 - Employ less than 200 people





Underutilisation - WA Labour Market






Apprenticeship and Traineeship Commencements



Western Australian employers have responded by taking on a record number of over 10,000 apprentices and trainees in the first quarter of 2022, the highest on record.





State Government Incentives

Never better to have an apprentice or trainee



- Fees halved for 210 qualifications
- Available at all WA TAFE colleges, and selected private training providers
 - Travel and Accommodation Allowance (TAA)
- Employer Incentives
 - Jobs and Skills WA (JSWA) Employer Incentive
 - Defence Industry incentive (DII)
 - Construction Training Fund (CTF) incentives
 - Payroll Tax Exemption (PTE)
 - Group Training Wage Subsidy



WA Group Training Program (WAGTP)



- Available to group training organisations (GTO) registered in WA.
- Provides incentive funding for GTOs to employ apprentices and trainees in priority target groups.
- The State priority target groups of apprentices and trainees to be supported include:
 - Aboriginal Australians;
 - people with disability;
 - women in non-traditional trades;
 - school based apprentices and trainees; and
 - people in remote and regional areas.
- To be eligible for WAGTP funding, GTOs must:
 - be registered to operate in WA as a GTO;
 - be compliant with the National Standards for Group Training Organisations; and
 - place their apprentices/trainees with host employers through a formal agreement.



Commonwealth Government incentives



Priority Wage Subsidy

- For employers of new or recommencing apprentices/trainees undertaking a Certificate III or higher, in occupations on the Commonwealth's Priority List
- 10% of wages for first and second year apprentices (up to \$1,500 per quarter), and 5% of wages for third year apprentice (up to \$750 per quarter)

Hiring Incentive

- For employers of new or recommencing apprentices/trainees undertaking a Certificate II or higher, in occupations that are not on the Commonwealth's Priority List; or in a Certificate II in an occupation on the Priority List
- \$3,500 (full time A+T) and \$1,750 (part-time A+T) paid in two equal six monthly instalments

Australian Apprentice Training Support Payment

- Direct financial assistance for apprentices/trainees undertaking Certificate III or higher, in a qualification on the Priority List
- \$1,250 (full time A+T) or \$625 (part time A+T) every six months over the first two years of apprenticeship/traineeship

- Job Ready programs connect job seekers with employers
- Current programs in:
 - Aged and Disability Care
 - Bricklaying
 - Driller's Offsider
 - Infrastructure (Civil construction)
 - Heavy vehicle driving drivers operations
 - Future Chef
 - Early Childhood Education and Care


Western Australian State Nominated Migration Program



- Western Australia received over 8,000 places for the 2022-23 program year and the third largest allocation in Australia
- In August 2022, more than 100 occupations added to the WA skilled occupation list, capturing priority industries
- The Graduate occupation list was also expanded to include over 330 occupations, to retain the skills and knowledge of international students
- This will provide industry with access to migrant workers where skilled local workers are not available to take up jobs

Construction Training Fund



- Construction Training Fund (CTF) collect a 0.2% levy from all construction projects over \$20,000.
- This levy is reinvested into supporting a safe, skilled and sustainable construction workforce.
- Grants are available for employers who take on apprentices and subsidies are available
 for businesses involved in construction work to complete additional skills training including
 occupational health and safety, licences, and business skills.
- A \$500 Apprentice Tool and Safety Equipment rebate has just been announced, as well
 as an additional 150 subsidised places for employers taking on Mature Age apprentices.
