

Factsheet CAT15 Categories of child-related work 15: an overnight camp



An overnight camp regardless of the type of accommodation or how many children are involved. This category captures a range of overnight camps with accommodation of a temporary nature, such as tents, camp sites, dormitories or hotels and motels.

An adult who is participating in a camp alongside their **child**, such as a father/daughter school camp, and does not take on a role in the camp, is not considered to be in <u>child-related work</u>.

Roles considered to be in child-related work

Some examples of roles considered to be in child-related work are listed below. Please note that in all cases, for a role to be considered to be in child-related work, the **usual duties** of that role must involve, or be likely to involve, **contact** with a child. Roles include:

- self-employed people, paid employees or volunteers, including parent volunteers, who work (such as supervising children and activities) on an overnight camp like those arranged by schools, religious organisations or clubs
- those working at the camp who do not stay overnight themselves, who have contact with children as part of their usual duties at the camp
- caretakers and kitchen staff of campsites who have contact with children as part of their usual duties at the camp
- people carrying out child-related work on a trip to another state, where the employees/volunteers leave with the children from WA and/or return with the children to WA.

Exemptions

Please note, there is no parent volunteer <u>exemption</u> for this category. The following exemptions apply:

- child volunteers work carried out by volunteers under 18 years of age
- unpaid students on placement under 18 years of age
- short-term visitors to WA
- one-off national events or national tours, refer to <u>Factsheet CRW02 Exemptions, one-off</u> <u>national events and national tours</u>

• police officers performing functions as a member of the WA Police.
