The first clean-up took place in Kings Park on Tuesday 28 February. Year 9 students from Bob Hawke College attended the event, helping to collect, audit and remove litter from the grassed area in front of one of the of the cafés in Kings Park. Interestingly, the students found over 50 items of sugar and sweetener packaging in and around the café. KABC will work with Kings Park to address this issue to encourage change and litter reduction.

Later that week, students from Kelmscott Senior High School braved the heat and removed over 46kgs of litter from Palomino Park near Champion Lakes in Armadale. KABC worked with the students to identify, sort and record litter into separate categories. City of Armadale Waste Services Officer Sarah Wallrodt organised for the litter to be collected and disposed of by the City of Armadale. The students made such a huge impact that they are looking at "adopting" the site through KABC's Adopt-a-Spot program to continue to keep it litter free.

KABC joined forces with staff from the <u>Shire of Carnarvon and local</u> <u>volunteers</u> to clean up Brockman Park. In just over an hour more than 36kgs of litter from the local park – including 11.5kgs of broken glass. The top items were: Plastic packaging – 360, Cardboard food packaging – 158, Plastic lids and tops – 136, Plastic film remnants – 125, Miscellaneous paper – 88.

Clean Up Australia events have now come to a close with over 750,000 volunteers registering 11,000 clean-up events across the country.

Community Litter Grants

KABC's Community Litter Grants of up to \$5,000 for local projects and \$10,000 for regional projects will be open on 15 April 2023 at a <u>clean-up event Freshwater Bay in Claremont</u>.

If you have a litter problem, or a litter reduction idea that needs assistance to come to fruition, you can apply through the KABC <u>Community Litter Grants</u> page.

Litter management at events and festivals, as well as community engagement projects, are also eligible. Applications via smartygrants.

Last year's recipient Walpole received a grant produce and produced a litter picking guidebook to inspire young people to help keep their towns tidy. Find out more and about past recipients <u>here.</u>

This year, Tidy Towns sustainable Communities Awards is collaborating with artist Merle Topsi who creates items made from plastic marine debris from her clean ups.
