





Below is a list of **categories** of [child-related work](#) that may apply to the tourism sector, where a person has a role that involves, or is likely to involve, **contact** with children as part of their **usual duties**.

This table is a guide only and not intended to be exhaustive. It does not include all circumstances or variations and the examples provided may also be subject to [exemptions](#).

Categories may include:	Roles may include:
 <p>14. A baby sitting or child minding service</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • people responsible for supervising lost children.
 <p>15. An overnight camp</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • people running activities for children at overnight camps • people supervising children at overnight camps regardless of whether the person is staying overnight themselves.
 <p>16. A transport service specifically for children</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • driver, bus aide or bus warden on private coach services for children's tours.
 <p>18. A children's entertainment or party service</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • people providing cultural information to children, such as an Aboriginal Elder giving a Welcome to Country and talking to children and On Country programs • people that provide interactive, 'educative entertainment' specifically for children, including school groups, at places of educational interest such as Scitech, zoos, museums, and national parks.

I run an environmental educational program for schools. The children are always supervised by a schoolteacher, why do I need a WWC Check?

You require a WWC Check because supervision by another adult is not a factor when determining child-related work.

I run a museum tour for the general public where children are often present. Why can't I get a WWC Check?

For a WWC Check to be required you would need to be providing interactive tours that have been specifically tailored for children only groups.

I run the café at a popular tourist spot and have contact with children on a regular basis, should I be getting a WWC Check?

No. There is no applicable category of child-related work for hospitality roles such as this.

I am part of a corporate volunteer program, assisting with children's educational programs at the zoo. The usual duties of my everyday role do not include contact with children. Do I need a WWC Check?

Yes. Your corporate volunteering is child-related work, so you need a WWC Check for that role. The organisation representative at the zoo should sign your Application for a WWC Check Form.
