#### Post 1 – No one plans a crash – mobile phones

Don't be tempted to look at your phone while driving. Plan to keep it somewhere out of reach.

## Seatbelts



### Post 1 – No one plans a crash – Seatbelts

It only takes a second and it could save your life, so plan to always wear your seatbelt.

### Post 3 – Always wear your seatbelt correctly (general)

Buckling your seatbelt is one of the easiest ways to protect drivers and passengers in a vehicle.

- Always ensure your seatbelt is properly adjusted and securely fastened.
- The sash should be placed over the middle of the shoulder and diagonally across the chest.
- The lap belt should sit snugly over the hips.
- Never share a seatbelt with a child on your lap.
- Children aged up to at least seven years must be restrained in an appropriate child car restraint.

## Post 4 – Always wear your seatbelt correctly (shoulder belt)

Wearing your seatbelt correctly can be the difference between life and death if involved in a crash.

As a driver you must ensure that everyone in your vehicle is properly restrained. Wearing your seatbelt incorrectly is also an offence and you may still receive an infringement.

## Post 5 – Unbelted driver or passenger

In a crash, not wearing a seatbelt means you'll keep moving at the car's speed until something stops you – like the dashboard, windscreen, or another person. Wear your seatbelt. It could save your life.

Running late? Just want to get there faster? Speeding might feel like the answer – until it isn't.

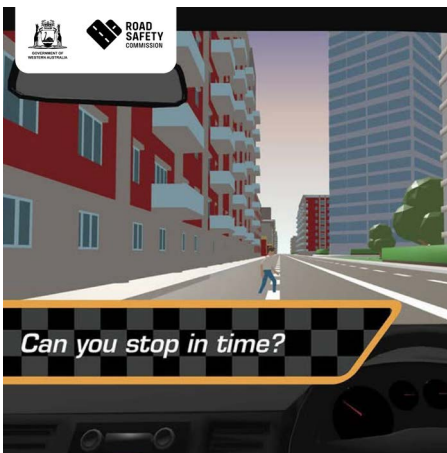
